

FIRST IMPRESSIONS by Mike Cresswell

Although this was not my first visit to Tanzania it was my first visit to Iringa and meeting with some of those who had been involved with SEED on the ground as it were for a number of years. It was around 6am that the taxi picked up Robert and I from the Kurasini Lutheran Hostel in Dar es Salaam where we had been staying since arriving in Tanzania. We were to meet Stevo who had taken time off work to escort us during our visits to the schools and interviewing the students SEED (that

is you) are supporting. It was a long dusty, bumpy journey to Iringa passing through some of the most beautiful countryside including Makumi National Park on the way. Our accommodation whilst in Iringa was at the Lutheran Centre where we were welcomed by very friendly and helpful staff. After a good night's sleep we met up with Sampson at the SEED office to collect bits and pieces needed for our first visit which was to be to Kiwele Secondary School about one hours drive from Iringa, and with a staff of 96 which includes 40 teachers. Of the 750 pupils registered here SEED are sponsoring 17 and after a short meeting with the Head Teacher we were given the opportunity to spend time with theses students and discuss their progress and the kind of things they needed to improve their learning. The students appeared to be very appreciative of our continued support of their education and this is noticeable in the cards which they have written to their sponsors.

The one thing that is so apparent whenever you visit a school in Tanzania is the joy on the faces of the pupils and the friendliness they show.

Over the weekend plans were made for some of our students who are at university. college or other educational establishments to come and meet with us in Iringa, 12

students were able to join us including Japhet who was the very first SEED student and who had recently finished his studies at Dodoma University. The opportunity to talk to students who had either completed or nearly completed their education and benefited from SEED's support was quite special, their appreciation and acknowledgement that without YOUR sponsorship and support this would never have happened was quite evident. One of the students suggested that those who had benefitted from SEED should look at the idea of establishing some kind of fund into which they could contribute so as to enable more students to be helped.

Monday saw us set off to visit Kalenga and Idodi Secondary Schools, we had now lost Stevo as he had had to return to Dar. Fortunately Sampson and Japhet agreed to come with us. Our first stop Kalenga where we met with Head teacher Mr.

Kachenie. Of the 652 students here 108 were boarders. SEED is sponsoring 16 pupils here and again we were able to meet them and discuss needs. Then onto Idodi where again we had a short meeting with the head before being given the

> opportunity to talk with the 22 SEED sponsored students. We were shown the work being carried out to refurbish the dormitories following the fire in March. there was a shortage of beds but the school had recently felled a tree and were making their own structures.





There is no doubt that what SEED has achieved since its inauguration is quite outstanding, it has enabled students to have an education through secondary school and in some cases on to college or university. It must be acknowledged that with your support, as sponsors, there is a group of Tanzanians better prepared to go out and meet the pressures of life and to benefit not only themselves but the

community they come from. To have had the opportunity to meet with the students and to hear their ideas for the future is so encouraging and I sincerely hope that SEED will continue for many many years to provide the opportunity for more to receive an education.
